
The Annual Picnic is for August 16th, so make plans to join in for great food, events for the kids and some great raffle prizes.

SPRING 2025 TOWN OF LENROOT REPORT

A state mandated reevaluation for all properties in the Town of Lenroot is nearly complete and will result in increased property values this fall. However, the total amount of money that the town can collect (levy) has been frozen for the last ten years except for a minor allowance for new construction. Over that period, our township's total levy increased under 1% per year. The inflation rate over the same period was 3% per year on average. This means that the tax you pay for township expenses will remain essentially the same as past years. We have maintained and improved town roads and infrastructure



thanks to applying for and receiving grants, cost sharing programs, partnering with township-based non-profits, wise use of loans, increased state aids and a conservative long-term approach to budgeting.

This summer, a mandated biannual inspection of the Phipps Road bridge over the Namakagon River was performed. The engineers determined that a 30-ton weight limit was required to maintain the bridge until it could be replaced. (Previous inspections showed that no limits were required.) Later, a more thorough follow-up inspection showed even more damage requiring a further weight limit reduction to 15-tons. The replacement process which will be similar to that required for the Tagalder Bridge, has started.

The lake drawdown was carried out last September and October. This enabled the instal-




lation of an additional cement pad to be added to the Nelson Lake Park boat landing to repair the washout caused by power loading at that landing. This pad was connected to the existing pads with stainless steel chain. Even if more washing occurs, there will be no impact on the landing's usefulness because of the increased water depth at the foot. Stop logs were reinstalled on March 4th, two weeks earlier than planned because of the lack of precipitation over the winter.




2023 SPRING FISHERIES SURVEY SUMMARY

NELSON LAKE, SAWYER COUNTY Report by Evan Sirianni

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Hayward Fisheries Management Team conducted a fyke netting survey on Nelson Lake from April 28 to April 29, 2023. The primary target was walleye, but useful data was also gathered on northern pike, yellow perch and black crappie. Ten nets were set overnight for one night, which resulted in 10 total net-nights of effort. An electrofishing survey was conducted on May 22, 2023 to target largemouth bass, smallmouth bass and bluegill and included five miles of shoreline. Quality, preferred and memorable sizes referenced in this summary are based on standard proportions of world record lengths developed for each species by the American Fisheries Society.













SUMMARY OF RESULTS

The netting survey was timed to target northern pike as they moved up into the shallows shortly after ice-out to spawn and was also very effective at surveying black crappies. The electrofishing survey was timed to assess largemouth bass and bluegills as the waters warmed and as these species moved up into shallower waters. Smallmouth bass are present within Nelson Lake; however, none were captured during the spring surveys. Nelson Lake is classified as a Complex-Cool-Dark lake according to the DNR fisheries lake classification system. The "Complex" classification refers to the number of gamefish present within the lake system. "Cool" and "Dark" terms refer to the lake's temperature and water clarity relative to other lakes. This report compares catch rates of lakes of the same classification as Nelson Lake.

WALLEYE

The catch of walleyes (4.6 per net-night) was just above the median (50%) for lakes of similar classification. The overall size was impressive, with 100% of the walleyes captured being above a quality size of 15 inches and 31% being above a preferred size of 20 inches. However, the catch rate was average to low. Nelson Lake has been stocked with walleye at an every-other-year basis in odd-numbered years. The walleye regulation on Nelson Lake is an 18-inch minimum length limit with a daily bag limit of three.

LARGEMOUTH BASS

Nelson Lake holds an impressive population of largemouth bass. The largemouth bass catch rate was 21 per mile, which was between the 75th and 90th percentile for lakes of the same classification as Nelson Lake. A quality size of 12 inches or more was attained by 84% of the largemouth captured, and 43% of them were at or above

a preferred size of 15 inches. Largemouth bass and smallmouth bass of any length may be kept in Nelson Lake with a daily bag limit of five fish (both species combined).

NORTHERN PIKE

Nelson Lake offers a high-density population of northern pike, with quality fish making up a large portion of the population. The catch rate of northern pike within the netting survey (23 per net-night) was right below the 100th percentile (24.17 per net-night) for lakes of the same classification. Northern pike caught over 21 inches in length made up 69% of the total sampled, and 17% were at or above a preferred size of 28 inches. The northern pike regulations for Nelson Lake are a daily bag limit of one that must be greater than 32 inches.

BLACK CRAPPIE

The black crappie catch rate within the netting survey was extremely high (218 per net-night), effectively at the 100th percentile when compared to other lakes of a similar classification. The proportion of quality-size fish (equal to or greater than 8 inches) was 18%, and fish greater than or equal to 10 inches only made up 1%. The panfish regulation for Nelson Lake is a combined species daily bag limit of 10.

BLUEGILL

The bluegill catch rate during the electrofishing survey (269 fish captured per mile) was between the 75th and 90th percentiles compared to similar lakes. Less than half (42%) of bluegills captured were equal to or above a quality size of 6 inches, and only 1% of fish caught were above a preferred size of greater than or equal to 8 inches. The panfish regulation for Nelson Lake is a combined species daily bag limit of 10.

WALLEYE STOCKING PLAN FOR NELSON LAKE 2024 – 2027

In the spring 2024 NLA newsletter, A walleye stocking plan for Nelson Lake was outlined. The goal is to increase the walleye numbers. On July 11, 2024, 9700 3" fingerlings were planted at a cost of \$7409. The fish were in good condition with no observed mortality.





This is a new approach from the extended growth walleye stocking done in the past. The NLA board has agreed to continue this level and timing for an additional three years.

Kayak Around the Big Island (August 17, 2024)

This year we had 13 participants and 3 dogs on the kayak around the big island. The weather cooperated with a light-winds, overcast skies and temperatures in the 70's. The main group started from the Gerlach boat landing at 10 AM, including paddlers from Tanning Point Road. Two additional paddlers joined in
